Dance and learn with Ririe-Woodbury at home! Lesson 4: Spring Acrostic Poem Dance

Hello students! Today's lesson is inspired by the arrival of springtime. On your walk around your neighborhood or in nature, you might have noticed colorful flowers popping up from the ground, or the trees starting to have tiny green leaves. Springtime is when the weather gets warmer and nicer, plants and creatures start growing and being more active ... All the wonderful new lives we see all around us make us want to sing and dance!

Reading activity

What is an Acrostic Poem?

An acrostic poem is a very fun poem to create. Each acrostic poem has a topic idea running down the left side of the poem. Each letter has a new idea that runs from left to right and is relevant to the topic word. The topic word is typically the theme or source of inspiration. Here is an example of a **SPRING** Acrostic Poem.

S lowly coming out

P retty flowers bloom

R ainbows are all around

Indigos are flying with joy

N o more hibernating

G et up and go outside!



Movement exploration and creating activity Let's create movement based on the example poem.

1. **S** lowly coming out



Imagine what is slowly coming out, and from where, in the springtime. Is it an animal, or a plant? Let's try moving with one idea, for instance, a seed of a dandelion. Can you make your body very small like a seed in the ground, and slowly come out and start growing to the sky?

2. **P** retty flowers bloom

What kind of movement does a flower make when it blooms? If you were a flower, how would you open up? Do you pop open with lots of energy? Slowly and softly unfold? Or sequentially, one petal at a time? What parts of your body can move as flower petals... how can you make your head, arms, and legs all parts of one HUGE flower blooming?

3. R ainbows are all around
There are many ways to create rainbows all
around... you can paint huge rainbows all

around the room with your imaginary paint! Paint with your hands, your legs, your head.



Or, can you create the shape of the colorful rainbow with your body?



A. Indigos are flying with joy Indigo is short for Indigo Bunting, which is a small bright blue bird in the cardinal family. This is the part of the poem where you can use the high space - the sky space! Make sure you have enough open and safe space to try big movements such as - jumping, leaping, skipping, gliding, darting, soaring - and don't forget to express the joyous feeling as you fly around!

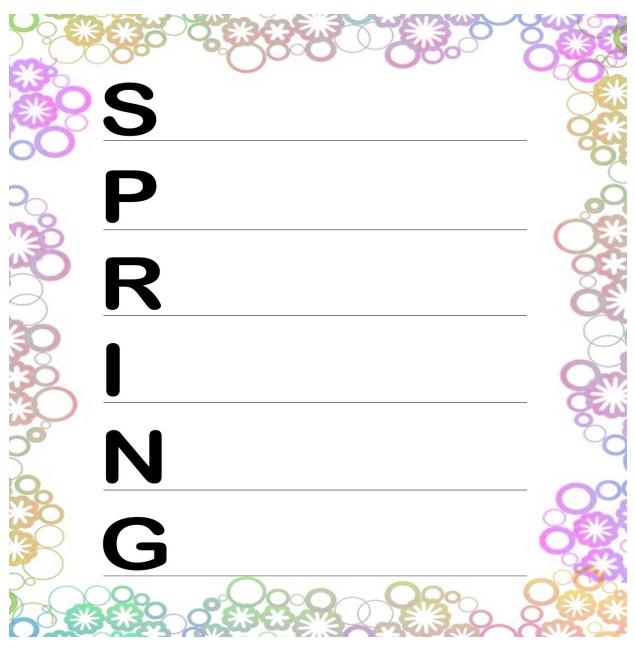


Time to perform and share Can you dance the whole poem?

- Find a piece of music that feels like springtime to you.
- Can you move through the whole poem without stopping? There are easy ways and challenging ways. One easy way is to find somebody to read the poem for you slowly, one line at a time, and you can dance
 - your way from the beginning to the end.
- Another way is to have the poem page right by you, so that you can look at what comes next, if you forget.
- If you want to challenge yourself, try to memorize all or parts of the poem. It helps to think about the transitions, connecting the dots slowly coming out to blooming, blooming to rainbows, rainbows to flying... so on and so forth. Practice a couple times before you show it to your family or friends.
